There is a shift in their countenance of their speech. These stories of war and peace are sacred and not always freely shared. "The difference in our care is now we know to notice."

There is also Jack and Val. Jack never missed a Veterans Day. He always wore his dress blues and proudly attended Veterans Day recognition. Jack came to be in hospice care and at the hospice house in October. A small group assembled to provide a Veteran's day service ceremony at the hospice house. When it came time for the ceremony Jack came out fully dressed in his service uniform in a wheel chair being pushed by his beloved wife Val. It was extremely moving and inspiring. Many were in awe of this man and his humble, dignified presence. What an honor to be with a Veteran on Veterans Day. Jack attended many Veterans Day celebrations, and Aspirus Comfort Care and Hospice Services was honored to provide the ceremony for his last celebration.
