Remembering a Hero: WWII Veteran Ted Szczepanski Passes Away at 105

In a tale of resilience and strength, a community bids farewell to a true American hero, Ted Szczepanski, a Grand Rapids native and World War II Veteran who passed away at the age of 105. His journey, filled with bravery, love, and an unwavering spirit, has left an indelible mark on the hearts of all who knew him.

Ted dedicated himself to a life of service. Born and raised in Grand Rapids, Michigan, he answered the call of duty during World War II, where he served in the 95th Division Infantry. Ted's dedication to his country took him through harrowing experiences, including a period as a prisoner of war for six months. His service to the nation exemplified the sacrifices made by the greatest generation, and it forged in him a strength that would carry him through many more battles in life.

Ted's story garnered public attention in May 2020 when he faced a unique battle – COVID-19, not once, but twice. His resilience in overcoming this modern-day adversary was a testament to his enduring spirit. It was a reminder that the courage he displayed in the face of WWII's challenges continued to shine brightly in his later years.

Ted's legacy extends far beyond his service record and his triumph over illness. He was known as a man of conviction who lived a life defined by honor and integrity. His story is a reminder of the values that have always made our nation strong: sacrifice, commitment, and love for family and country.

As we remember Ted Szczepanski, we are reminded of the sacrifices and the enduring spirit of the World War II generation. Their stories serve as a source of inspiration for us all, a reminder that we can overcome any challenge when we face it with courage and determination.

Veterans Day - November 11

World War I, known at the time as “The Great War,” officially ended when the Treaty of Versailles was signed on June 28, 1919 in the Palace of Versailles outside the town of Versailles, France. However, fighting ceased seven months earlier when an armistice, or temporary cessation of hostilities, between the allied nations and Germany went into effect on the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month. For that reason, November 11, 1918 is generally regarded as the end of “the war to end all wars.”

Veterans Day continues to be observed on November 11, regardless of the day of the week on which it falls. The restoration of the observance of Veterans Day to November 11 not only preserves the historical significance of the date, but helps focus attention on the important purpose of Veterans Day: a celebration to honor America’s Veterans for their patriotism, love of country, and willingness to serve and sacrifice for the common good.

Dare to Forgive with Deborah Grassman and Opus Peace

Withhold forgiveness and you cut yourself off from a compelling force in the soul that seeks it. If someone is unable to achieve forgiveness, they might arrive at the end of life filled with bitterness, a venom that complicates peaceful dying.

You won't want to miss the two-part, newly-released film, Dare to Forgive. Stephanie Turner (Kansas City Hospice) and Ralph Ozmun (Smoky Mountain Hospice) join Deborah Grassman to provide forgiveness concepts in Part I on November 8, and in Part II on November 15, attendees will view nine short film clips and engage in panel discussion of how forgiveness can be applied in various situations. 1.5 CEs will be provided to nurses, social workers, and counselors.

Ambassadors play a very important role in advancing our policy priorities by building relationships with legislative offices, educating fellow hospice and palliative care advocates, and mobilizing our advocacy efforts within their communities and networks. Ambassadors have one formal policy and advocacy meeting per month, as well as an optional monthly mentorship meeting to network with other ambassadors from across the country. Outside of meetings, HAN provides support and guidance to Ambassadors in their advocacy activities, including legislative outreach and facility visits.
