

UPCOMING CHANGES TO WE HONOR VETERANS

The We Honor Veterans team is excited to share some changes coming up in the next few months that will update the look and feel of WHV and give partners and consumers a better experience. We're highlighting some of those changes here; you can also find this message on the <u>Announcements page</u> of the WHV website.

NEW WEBSITE AND LOGO

We are currently developing a new website design and logo for WHV. The site will be easier to navigate, and the new logo will mirror the new NHPCO branding with a similar logo format. The plan is to launch the new website and logo in April. At that time, new partner logos will be available, as well. Partners should keep this in mind if they are planning on using their logo on any merchandise or ordering any goods to display their WHV level.

Along with the refreshed website, we will update the process for submitting activity reports. If you are currently working on an activity report, please ensure that the final is submitted before midnight (EST) on Monday, March 9, 2020. Any incomplete activity reports will be deleted when we switch over to the new website.

NEW LEVEL REQUIREMENTS

To go along with the updated website and logo, the partner level system is being refreshed:

- 1. The Recruit Partner level will no longer be listed in the WHV partner directory. Moving forward, the directory will include active partners beginning at Level 1. Any current Recruit Partners must complete a Level 1 activity report by Monday, March 9 to be included in the partner directory.
- 2. The Level 5 Partner program will only be available to current NHPCO members. The current VA contract with WHV concludes in September of this year. Collaborative efforts with VA leadership and local facilities will always continue. As we initiate the search for new avenues of support, NHPCO will continue keeping members at the forefront of their efforts. Partner Levels 1-4 will remain open to anyone. Further details regarding Level 5 submissions and cut-off dates for non-members will be sent out shortly to those already working on Level 5 activities. Please note that if you are not currently a member of NHPCO, you may no longer register your commitment to becoming a Level 5 partner.
- 3. All partners must remain active. If an organization does not continue to log in to their account or move up the levels, they will be removed from the partner directory.



PARTNER HIGHLIGHTS

SUBMISSION FROM: HOSPICE OF ST. FRANCIS **TITUSVILLE, FL (LEVEL 4)**

Hospice of St. Francis has been fortunate to partner with several long-term care nursing facilities here in Brevard County, Florida. One of the projects we have been doing is the Wall of Honor. Hospice of St Francis collaborated with local Veterans and sponsored Wall of Honor ceremonies at these facilities where often forgotten heroes are residing at the end of life. Our staff and volunteers find great joy and reward in honoring these individuals as well as supporting the facilities that are caring for them. It is a gift to witness the look of pride and joy on the Veteran's face when he/she finds their picture on the wall.

SUBMISSION FROM: 24/7 AT HOME CARE AND HOSPICE **WESTMINSTER, CA (LEVEL 3)**

Ung Nguyen honorably served his country as a Colonel in the Army of the Republic of Vietnam (ARVN), from 1936-1955 and The Republic of Vietnam Navy from 1955-1975. Much of his service was spent serving alongside first the French and later American troops during the Vietnam conflict. Following the end of the Vietnam war, Colonel Nguyen and all five of his Veteran sons were sentenced to 5 years of prison. Shortly after their release, the family migrated to the United States, where they now enjoy the freedoms that they helped to defend. 24/7 Care at Home Hospice recently threw this patient a 102nd birthday party and honored him during the ceremony with his family present.

SUBMISSION FROM: SAN FRANCISCO HOSPICE VETERAN PARTNERSHIP

The San Francisco Hospice Veteran Partnership completed a winter donation drive. They collected reading materials and toiletries for Veterans hospitalized at the San Francisco VA. Veterans were surveyed before the drive and identified these items to be high priority needs. Reading materials were added to mobile book carts that move around the hospital, and toiletries will be handed out to Veterans who did not initially expect to be admitted to the hospital. HVP members that helped were St. Joseph Memorial Hospice, Seasons Hospice, SutterHealth, and Collabria Care.
